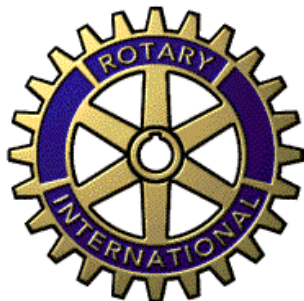

Another Rotary success story!

Greetings/Update from Walter Ladwig

California U.S.A

I understand that the San Diego district recently had the Rotary Foundation Seminar up at the Salk Institute. I still have great memories from that day, and I wanted to fill you and the Mission Valley East club in on what I have been doing since finishing my Ambassadorial Scholarship.

While still in Prague I made the decision to return to graduate school to earn a Masters degree in International Relations. I was accepted into the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton. In addition, I was awarded a graduate fellowship that provided full tuition and a stipend for living expenses. There is no doubt in my mind that the prestige of the Ambassadorial scholarship, and the (something) experience that I gained while living the Czech Republic significantly enhanced my competitiveness for graduate school (in addition to Princeton, I was accepted at Harvard and Johns Hopkins.)

At Princeton I focused my studies on national security and U.S. defense policy. This naturally led me to a stint at the Pentagon. Between May and August of last year, I

worked as a speechwriter on Secretary Rumsfeld's staff. While at the Pentagon I had a draft a number of speeches ranging from September 11th related memorials to congressional testimony. Working as speechwriter gave me both a great opportunity to see the inner workings of the Pentagon and a chance to work with the Secretary of Defense.

Last fall I had an opportunity to make my first trip to Africa. I worked as part of a policy team that was examining the withdrawal of UN peacekeepers from Sierra Leone. Though rich in diamonds, Sierra Leone is one of the world's most impoverished countries. Conflict diamonds (also called blood diamonds) were smuggled out of the country to fund a brutal ten year civil war that has left the nation in tatters. The RUF rebel group that waged war against the elected government made international headlines with its brutal tactic of chopping off the arms of people they suspected of being loyal to the government. The conflict finally ended when British troops intervened to smash the rebel army. Although peace was declared in January 2002, it is very fragile and many local groups are afraid that if the UN were to withdrawal its troops, violence could return. That was the backdrop for our in-country assessment. As part of our research, my team of six traveled to Sierra Leone for a week, where we conducted field research and interviews. Despite the ravages of the civil war, there is a Rotary chapter in Freetown (the capital.) I was hoping to attend the meeting of the Freetown chapter, but the day of the meeting I was upcountry visiting Pakistani peacekeepers. Upon returning to the United States, my team produced a seventy five page report that we then briefed to the Africa Bureau of the State Department in Washington, DC, and the Peacekeeping Department of the United Nations in New York. As you can imagine, it was quite an experience!

Despite returning to the US, I have kept in touch with many of my friends in Prague. In April, my wife Jen and I went to the wedding of a friend of mine in Prague. The lead up to a traditional Czech wedding even involved a trip to the bride's village and an elaborate ceremony where we had to "buy" the bride from the collective villagers.

In June I graduated from Princeton, and now I live in Washington. I am currently working for a defense analysis firm that conducts long term "deep thinking" studies for the Department of Defense. I enjoy my work tremendously; however, my wife and I remain hopeful that we can return to San Diego some time soon. Unfortunately, for the time being, most of the defense analyst jobs are in the Capitol area. Perhaps after I gain a few years of experience I can come back to San Diego and consult for the Navy :>

As I write this, I realize how amazing and exciting the last two years have been. Rotary (particularly the folks at Mission Valley East) played a principal role in opening doors for me by selecting me as an Ambassadorial Scholar. I am extremely grateful for everything that Rotary has given me, and I look forward to giving back in return. Please pass my greetings along to the Mission Valley club. I hope I can pay a visit the next time I am in San Diego.

Rotary Woman Spearheads School Building Project in Tiruchirapalli, Tamil Nadu, India

Deborah Lindholm, International Chair for La Jolla Sunrise Rotary Club of District 5340, exemplifies and personifies the Rotary spirit of International Service. During the past five years, Deborah and her Rotarian friends and associates in the Foundation for Women (FFW) have raised more than \$100,000 for microcredit loans to more than 60,000 women in the district of Trichy, in impoverished southern India. The loan repayment rate is an astonishing 99.3% among these the poorest of the poor on the planet.



On a recent trip to India, Deborah and her colleagues committed to building a modern concrete school; construction has already begun. On September 5, S. Deveraj, microcredit program coordinator from India, was welcomed to San Diego for a kick-off capital campaign luncheon and reception. In attendance were **District 5340 Governor Mike Stelman and RI Foundation Chair Larry Scott**. In just a few hours, \$6,750 of the \$100,000 needed for the building fund was raised. Deborah says that "with God's help and your donations, this grassroots effort will result in the building being completed by the end of 2003."



Deborah and her La Jolla Sunrise Rotary raised an additional \$10,000, which when matched with DDF (District Designated Funds) and RI, will result in a new \$25,000 grant in cooperation with Raja Michael's Rotary Club of Tiruchirapalli, of District 3000. This money will be used to equip the school with educational materials, computers, uniforms and to purchase van transportation for the children to and from rural villages. The direct educational cost is only \$25/student/year. The school will offer a first-ever educational opportunity for 500 children of microcredit borrowers and their families, who are living on less than \$1/day for a family of five.

The current "bricks and mortar campaign" features many ways to support the school building effort: buy a brick for \$25, mortar for \$1/foot, a door or a window for \$100, or a wall for \$1,000. All donations at whatever level are genuinely welcome and appreciated.

You or your Rotary club can help with this effort. Your club foundation may wish to sponsor a classroom for \$10,000. Immunization Seminar

What is the Don't Wait Vaccinate Committee?

Because of Rotary's success in worldwide eradication of polio, Rotarians were asked to help with the improvement of infant immunization rates here in the United States.

In the early 1990s, infant immunization rates in the USA for children under two-against all childhood diseases including polio-was approximately 50%, one of the lowest rates in the entire world. Rotary International launched this program in 1994, under the name "PolioPlusUSA."

The District 5340 "Don't Wait Vaccinate" Committee was formed in 1994 and has been meeting monthly ever since. **Cheryl Wilson** of the Downtown Rotary club has generously provided a meeting room and continental breakfast at St. Paul's Senior Home in Hillcrest.

Rotarians **Larry Scott, Amnon Ben-Yehuda, Glenn Kellogg, Michael Bardin, Burt Nestor and Chuck Ayers** regularly attend. Others are welcome to join us.

Also in attendance is **Cathy Booth** from the San Diego County Immunization Program. We are part of the San Diego County Immunization Initiative (I-3), a coalition of more than 130 community and health service organizations, whose goal is to raise immunization rates in children and adults. These combined efforts have raised rates in children under two from 51% in 1987 to 81 to 85% today. The effort is ongoing.

The purpose of the district committee is to motivate and guide Rotary clubs in

District 5340 to launch immunization projects in their respective communities. These are hands-on projects, usually with local clinics and schools. It is distinctly not a fundraiser.

Each year at the Rotary Foundation Seminar, a plaque is presented to the club that has helped the most in achieving our goal. We are available to give programs to clubs about immunizations. BONSALL

The Rotary Club of Bonsall is ready to roll with its "Luau in Paradise" fundraiser on September 27, reports club **President Randy Carlson**. The event will include food, drink, Polynesian dancers and dancing under the stars for a festive celebration. The annual "Bonsall Rotary Wine and Food Festival" will take place in early June. The event this year was a huge success with 143 wineries pouring, gourmet food from local restaurants, and good music and dancing-and more than 900 people in attendance!

The Bonsall Rotarians plan to continue their annual housebuilding in Mexico and are excited about their new international projects of adopting kids at a girl's orphanage in Tecate and a hands-on project of improving a fresh water system, sewer system, and other maintenance projects at a boy's orphanage, also in Tecate. Bonsall Rotary continues with its support of the REINS Therapeutic Horsemanship Program for the handicapped. The club contributes financially and with work projects. The enthusiastic and dedicated

support of each Bonsall Rotarian is the key to the success of this small club's projects.

CARLSBAD HI-NOON

The Carlsbad Hi-Noon Rotary Club welcomes Rotarians and other guests to Monday noon meetings. Visitors are welcomed heartily with the club's famous "welcome song." The club, chartered in 1980, has about 70 members. It sponsors an Interact club at Carlsbad High School, sends facilitators and students to RYLA, hosts the Summer Youth Camp, provides local children with a holiday party in early December and works with orphanages in Central America and Mexico.

The club's biggest fundraiser is the Oktoberfest, held the first Saturday in October in Holiday Park, Carlsbad. This event is co-sponsored with the Carlsbad Rotary Club, the Women's Resource Center and the Carlsbad Boys and Girls Club. All share the work and the proceeds. In addition to all the club's many service projects, **President Bob Fenner** reports this club has some athletic bragging rights, too. It has won the Rotary volleyball tournament two out of the last three years. Two years ago, it finished second. The club will host of the Family of Rotary Volleyball Tournament, involving two Rotary Zones, in February-watch for announcements. And if that is not enough, the club placed third in the Rotary Golf Tournament in San Diego last year.

ESCONDIDO

The Escondido Rotary Club is the third largest club in the district with more than 190 members. Each week member sing a completely new song, especially written to recognize the speaker or program for the day. To their knowledge, this is the only club in the Rotary world that does this.

More than 50 of the club's members have perfect attendance for the past year, and **President Norm Syler** is busy implementing his theme of "Recognition and Involvement." The club has a special heart for education in the community, including scholarships, student awards, student guests and an adopted school. The Rotarians support the Escondido Boys and Girls Club, RYLA, the YMCA, and have sponsored a Boy Scout troop for more than 50 years.

The club always has been active in the PolioPlus fight. In 1998-99, members raised \$43,000 to start the district toward a banner year. One member, Dr. Nick Tsoulos, has traveled to Eritrea to assist in the polio immunization effort there. In just the last two years, the club has collected another \$43,332 for this important fight.

The Escondido Rotary Club has already provided five governors for District 5340 and is the home club of **District Governor-elect Sandi Rimer**.

FALLBROOK VILLAGE

The Fallbrook Village Rotary Club has embarked on an ambitious project to reduce the likelihood of Type II Diabetes onset among children in the community. The project,

called the Defeat Diabetes Campaign, was conceived as the club's Rotary Centennial contribution to the community. According to club **President Dennis Lindeman**, their concept is to bring the benefits of medical, educational and other community resources together to test all children in Fallbrook, Bonsall, DeLuz, and Rainbow and make all parents aware of the disease symptoms. The Rotarians plan to bring to parents the information and insight needed to positively enhance the quality of life of their children.

So far, this collaborative effort has involved the Fallbrook Healthcare District, the Fallbrook Union Elementary School District, the Fallbrook Community Center, the Boy's and Girl's Club, the ADA, and the Village News.

Way to go, Fallbrook Village Rotary Club!

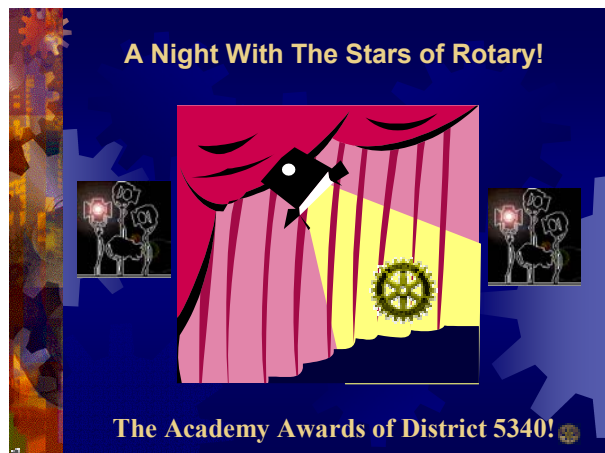
SAN LUIS REY

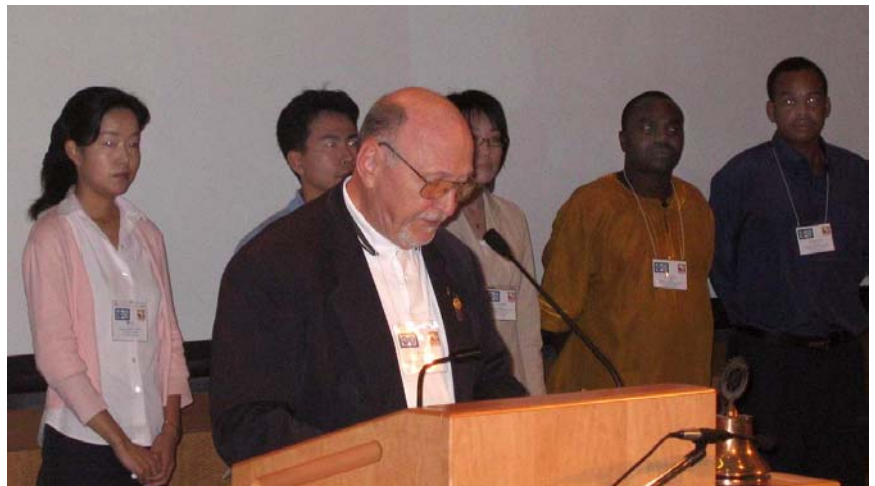

The three to five month program of Rotary's Grants For University Teachers was recognized as the key fit to partner Rotary with Scripps by sending professors from Scripps to teach in developing countries.

Drs. Walter Berger and Alexander (Sasha) Gershunov will teach in Chile and Russia, respectively, in early 2004. Water quality problems in developing countries require better education to facilitate corrective measures to bad situations impacting health and environment. Berger's Rotary Host Club is La Jolla Golden Triangle with Rotarian, **Irwin Rubenstein**, as Host Club Counselor. Alexander (Sasha) Gershunov has La Jolla Sunrise as Host Club and Rotarian, **George Dewhurst**, as Host Club Counselor. The Host Clubs and Host Club Counselors are responsible for the orientation to Rotary of both scholars prior to their departure.

This Rotary Foundation program is funded through Annual Giving donations to The Rotary Foundation by donors within District 5340. WHEW! One year and thirty-three units later, Saba **Tesfayohannes Kidane** and **Peter Mumo Gathuru** have achieved their Masters Degree in International Studies at the **USD/Joan B. Kroc Institute** For Peace and Justice. Saba and Peter were among the first cohort of the new \$25 million center financed by Joan Kroc. Joan's intent is to have this facility be a font of learning, communication, and conference for those interested in fostering world peace and understanding...the same goal as our Rotary Foundation!

With this mutual goal, it was clear that we in District 5340 wanted a hands-on relationship in promotion of world peace and understanding...and our connection with the Joan B. Kroc IPJ was the answer.

Actually, our 5340 involvement began nearly five years ago when **Dr. Cynthia Villis**, Associate Provost at USD and member of the La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary Club, and **PDGs Steve Brown and Wayne Cusick** laid the groundwork for this peace connection between USD and Rotary District 5340.

In 2000/01, the first recipient of our Donated Scholarship was **Dr. Suhas Nambiar** of the Gujarat Vidyapith University in Ahmedabad, India, Rotary District 3050. In 2001/02, our recipient was **Genevieve Kyarimpa** of Kampala, Uganda in District 9200. This year, the first official year of the Kroc IPJ, saw us bring Saba from Eritrea and Peter from Kenya...both in District 9200.

These Rotary Ambassadorial scholarships are valued up to \$25,000. In 2004/05, our District SHARE Committee has approved one scholar from 9200 to attend the Kroc IPJ. We would not enjoy this peace connection with the USD/KROC IPJ if it weren't for **Provost Frank Lazarus's** help with many fees and expenses. Our gratitude is extended to **Dr. Cynthia Villis** for her on-going dedication and tireless work to assist the scholars. Other key players on the Kroc IPJ team include **Drs. Lee Ann Otto and**

Joyce Neu. Today, we look for qualified scholars who also receive a Fulbright Scholarship and are from District 9200 where we have focused a large part of our international efforts over the past seven years. The financial input from Rotary, Fulbright, and USD combine to make this connection possible.

The real heroes in this program are the Host Clubs and their Host Club Counselors who “adopt” a scholar for the school year and make them feel welcome in San Diego. Their responsibilities include orientation of the scholar and settling in upon their arrival in San Diego, participation in club meetings at least once per month, involvement in club activities/work projects, and inclusion in District events.
